Frank Taylor, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and welcomed all in attendance. Roll call was taken at that time.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Nicholas Cordero, CUNY School of Medicine student, said that he and his fellow classmates are doing a Community Health Assessment for Jackson Heights. It is an anonymous survey to assess the individual and community health care needs of members of the Jackson Heights community.

PUBLIC INFORMATION

Assemblyman Jeffrion Aubry – District 35

Assemblyman Jeffrion Aubry said that the issue of bail reform goes back when there were three separate laws that came together to address three issues of criminal justice. He said one was the issue of a speedy trial because no one should be sitting in jail waiting for a long period for their trial. The other is Discovery which means that the District Attorney must let the defendant know what they are being charged with and what evidence is being presented against them. The third is Bail Reform. Individuals accused of a crime were sitting in jail because they didn't have a speedy trial and Discovery wasn't working for them because they were poor. When someone has no resources, they can't make bail and were kept in jail until the trial. AM Aubry said the system doesn't work for poor people. AM Aubry said they want to be extra careful to ensure that people are not railroaded, sent to jail because they're poor and couldn't get the right defense. He said in this country people who are black or brown, or speak a different dialect are sometimes not treated equal.

AM Aubry said that before the bill for bail reform was passed there was concern that the criminal justice system was going to be turned upside down. There was a lot of political pressure from both sides that caused a change. The law was modified to increase the number of crimes a person could be bail eligible. Individuals who were accused of a crime were given the least restrictive. Which meant they would have ankle monitors or report to a Probation Officer.

AM Aubry said that there has been a surge of crime since COVID, and it has been blamed on bail reform. He pointed out that NYC Comptroller Brad Lander did a report on bail reform and found that people showed up for their court appearances.

AM Aubry said that they have negotiated with the Governor to increase certain issues that will be bail eligible. For example, for gun charges the judge must consider when setting bail if the individual might cause harm to himself, someone else or someone that he might have threatened.

AM Aubry said he believes that one of the primary things to do is eliminating guns in the community and of irresponsible people. He noted that in Community Board 3 there is a good relationship with the 115th Precinct. That is why some parts of the community there is a low crime rate.

Margaret Flanagan, resident, asked how bail reform can address repeat offenders.

AM Aubry responded that if someone has been convicted of a crime and served their time that crime is no longer relevant to whatever they're charged with. If someone is currently out on bail and commits a crime, then the judge and district attorney have the right to remand that person. Remand means that the individual should not be allowed to be in society until it is determining their guilt or innocence.

Board Member Marlene Tapper asked if it was true that the Office of Children and Family Services has a \$800 million cut from their budget but the owner of Buffalo Bills received \$850 million for his stadium.

AM Aubry said that he doesn't believe they cut \$800 million from the Office of Children and Family Services. Governor Hochul decision to support Buffalo Bills was for the economy.

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Board Member Lobsang Salaka asked how legislation can help to reduce the increase in crimes and streets.

AM Aubry responded that legislation is not the answer to stop crime. Appropriate policing and funding for mental services is needed.

A resident asked when the 115th Precinct will have a full staff.

AM Aubry responded that it is a city issue and the 115th Precinct should always be full staff. That should be address with the City Council.

Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas – District 34

Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas reported that since being in office there have been three fires in the district. She said that she was at the scene for the recent fire at 83-09 35th Avenue. Assy González-Rojas commended first responders, 115th Precinct and the Red Cross for assisting the victims of the fire. The Red Cross has partnered with Assy González-Rojas office and kept in contact with residents impacted by the fire to make sure they were settled in their hotel.

AM González-Rojas said there has been positive outcomes in the budget:

- There will be childcare centers in CUNY campuses
- \$1.1 billion went for distress hospital funding
- Broadband projects
- \$1.1 billion dollars is going for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program and the Landlord Rental Assistance Program.
- MTA will receive \$475 million
- Health coverage for immigrants over 65 years old
- Funding for a program to cover COVID utility arrears

The district was hit hard by hurricane Ida. Assy González-Rojas said that funding has been secured for relief for families that had damage and don't have immigration status. There is also funding for homeowners who did not get enough funding from FEMA.

There is a one million dollar increase for the Nutrition Outreach and Education Program that will increase funding for the neediest New Yorkers. It will make sure that nobody can go hungry in the community. AM González-Rojas said that Hunger Free America opened an office in East Elmhurst and are assisting with SNAP enrollment.

AM González-Rojas announced that on Saturday, May 21, 2022, there will be a paper shredding event at Staples in Woodside between 10:00am – 4:00pm.

Board Member Edwin Westley asked when the signage will be in place at Assy González-Rojas office.

AM González-Rojas said that she wasn't sure if she was going to stay in the location where former Assy Michael DenDekker had his office because of redistricting. They are losing some of Jackson Heights. The office is located at Jackson Heights Shopping Center, 75-35 31 Ave., Suite 206B.

Council Member Shekar Krishnan

Council Member Shekar Krishnan reported that there were visits to the district from NYC Parks Commissioner Susan Donoghue, NYC Small Business Commissioner Kevin Kim, and NYC Mayor Eric Adams. They came to the community to hear what resources are needed. NYC Transportation Commissioner Ydanis Rodriguez took a tour on Northern Blvd to see the safety concerns.

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CM Krishnan has visited all the parks in the district. As Chair of the Committee on Parks and Recreation it's his mission to highlight how parks and green space are a public health and social justice issue. At the Parks budget hearing he fought for one billion dollars of the city budget for parks and attended a big rally at City Hall to draw attention to the need for city government to invest in parks.

CM Krishnan had meetings with Chancellor David Banks and The Department of Education to push for more resources for public schools in particular a dual language education.

CM Krishnan announced that his Office partnered with Elmhurst Hospital, Elected Officials, and other health organizations for a Public Health Week.

There was a hearing with HPD about fires. CM Krishnan questioned the Deputy Commissioners about the importance of city agencies providing more services for tenants who were vacated because of fires. CM Krishnan he mentioned the 89th Street tenants.

CM Krishnan announced that movie nights in the summer coming soon.

The representative spoke for the owner who was present. She said it's a 100% ownership and no changes for the current method of operation.

Himalayan Group LLC dba Bamboo House Bar – 76-03 37th Ave, Jackson Heights (Corp. Change)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the applicant is seeking a Corporate Change. Mr. Rosenbaum called upon the owner of Bamboo House Bar.

The owner was not present.

The Neighbors NYC Corp. – 85-13 Northern Blvd., Jackson Heights (New – Full Liq)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the applicant is seeking a Full Liquor license. Mr. Rosenbaum called upon the owner of Neighbors NYC Corp.

The owner has been in the restaurant business for 10 years. She wants to own a restaurant with a menu that has a mixture of Latin American cuisines from different parts of Southern Central America.

Moon Cheese Pizzeria Inc. – 88-11 31st Ave, East Elmhurst (New – Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp. Permit)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the applicant is seeking a Wine/Beer/Cider license. Mr. Rosenbaum called upon the owner of Moon Cheese Pizzeria.

The representative spoke for the owner who was present. The owner is a pastry chef and sold pastries throughout Jackson Heights. He just started operating his own family restaurant.

Board Member Jairo Rodriguez said that he has known the owner for years. The owner is a decent person who will be a good neighbor.

Chairman Frank Taylor said that he visited the establishment. He found the owner to be upstanding and the food is fresh.

La Fortuna Bar & Rest. Inc. – 99-11 39th Ave, Corona (New – Wine/Beer/Cider)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the applicant is seeking a Wine/Beer/Cider license. Mr. Rosenbaum called upon the owner of La Fortuna Bar and Restaurant.

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The owner said that she and her mother are starting their own Dominican restaurant and would like to offer wine and beer.

La Tamaleria Colombiana Inc. – 32-23 Junction Blvd., East Elmhurst (New- Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp.)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the applicant is seeking a Wine/Beer/Cider license. Mr. Rosenbaum called upon the owner of La Tamaleria Colombiana.

The representative spoke for the owner who was present. The Colombian restaurant has been opened for a year. It is family oriented that specializes in Colombia tamales as well as offer vegan options.

Himalayan Group LLC dba Bamboo House Bar – 76-03 37th Ave, Jackson Heights (Corp. Change)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the committee recommends **approval** of an application for a Corporate Change for this applicant. Mr. Rosenbaum said that the Executive Committee decided to move forward with the application because of the language barrier with the applicant and the Corporate Change was granted by the State Liquor Authority.

Board Member Sonya Davis Roberts asked why the Board is moving forward with a vote if the SLA approved the Corporate Change without the Community Board's knowledge.

Mr. Rosenbaum said they are going forward as procedure.

Motion # 18 - Himalayan Group LLC dba Bamboo House Bar – 76-03 37th Ave, Jackson Heights (Corp. Change)

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Rosenbaum, seconded by Mark Buhrmester, the motion to **approve** the application was passed with 31 in Favor, 2 Opposed and 8 Abstention.

Board Member Sonya Davis Roberts said she abstain because there should have been more explanation to the whole Board on why the committee agreed to approve the application.

Kevin Hughes-Noboa, Second Vice Chair, said he abstain because he did not appreciate the SLA going over the head of the Community Board.

Board Member Lobsang Salaka said he abstain because he felt since the SLA approved the Corporate Change it didn't make sense to vote.

Board Member Marlene Tapper said she abstain because she doesn't support businesses that circumvent.

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Chairman Frank Taylor said that language shouldn't have been a barrier when the Board has people who speak different languages. He thinks it's a way of circumventing the Community Board.

The Neighbors NYC Corp. – 85-13 Northern Blvd., Jackson Heights (New – Full Liq)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the committee recommends **disapproval** of an application for a Full Liquor license for this applicant due to an oversaturation of licenses on the immediate block and not meeting the public convenience necessary to grant an additional license within a 500-foot radius of similarly licensed premises.

Board Member Shanel Thomas asked are applicants made aware if they can get liquor license beforehand.

Mr. Rosenbaum said he is not sure if they are made aware.

Board Member Mark Buhrmester said that the location used to be a bar, so the applicant probably was not aware of the 500-foot rule.

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Rosenbaum, seconded by Frank Taylor, the motion to **disapprove** the application was passed with 25 in Favor, 15 Opposed and 1 Abstention.

Moon Cheese Pizzeria Inc. – 88-11 31st Ave, East Elmhurst (New – Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp. Permit)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the committee recommends **approval** of an application for a Wine/Beer/Cider license for this applicant.

Motion # 20 - Moon Cheese Pizzeria Inc. – 88-11 31st Ave, East Elmhurst (New – Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp. Permit)

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Rosenbaum, seconded by Lisa Mesulam, the motion to **approve** the application was passed with 39 in Favor, 3 Opposed and 0 Abstentions.

La Fortuna Bar & Rest. Inc. – 99-11 39th Ave, Corona (New – Wine/Beer/Cider)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the committee recommends **approval** of an application for a Wine/Beer/Cider license for this applicant provided a stipulation has been signed. The stipulation was signed.

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Rosenbaum, seconded by Lisa Mesulam, the motion to **approve** the application was passed with 34 in Favor, 5 Opposed and 0 Abstentions.

La Tamaleria Colombiana Inc. – 32-23 Junction Blvd., East Elmhurst (New- Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp.)

Mr. Rosenbaum reported that the committee recommends **approval** of an application for a Wine/Beer/Cider license for this applicant.

Motion # 22 - La Tamaleria Colombiana Inc. – 32-23 Junction Blvd., East Elmhurst (New- Wine/Beer/Cider, Temp.)

Upon motion duly made by Mr. Rosenbaum, seconded by Mark Buhrmester, the motion to **approve** the application was passed with 37 in Favor, 4 Opposed and 0 Abstentions.

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Chairperson's Report

Frank Taylor, Chairman, read his report:

This is my third month as Chairman, and it was very busy. I attended 21 events and/or meetings in this timeframe. Here are the top five:

Met with the 89th St. Tenants Association, State Senator Jessica Ramos, Assemblywoman Rojas and Councilmember Shaker, AOC representatives, the Inspector for the 115 Precinct along with his staff and an attorney from New York City Police Department. In approximately 2 hours we got through 10 months of gridlock. Thank you to all the representatives and residents who participated in this process. It was very productive.

Second meeting was with Elmhurst Hospital. We discussed a wish list, and we appreciate them being partners in the community. Thank you, Helen.

Third meeting was with the Queens Borough President Mr. Donovan Richards which included the new DOT Commissioner Rodriquez and we also got to meet the head of City Planning. It was very good to get some points in with him about development of our Board area.

We were able to do a walk-through of Roosevelt Avenue with Deputy Inspector Altaheri and one of his officers. We got to meet some of the restaurateurs and bar owners. This walk-through took place at approximately 1:00am in the morning.

I was also able to meet with the Jackson Heights Beautification group. It was a good meeting and I'm looking forward to meeting with other groups in our community. I believe communication and visibility in our communities is paramount in building successful relationships in our Board area.

Mr. Taylor thanked Senator Jessica Ramos, Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas, CM Shekar Krishnan, the 115th Precinct and Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez for meeting with 89th Street Tenants. He said a lot was accomplished at the meeting.

District Manager's Report

District Manager Giovanna Reid reported that on Tuesday, April 26, 2022, at 6:30pm, MTA will have a workshop pertaining to the redesign of Bus Network.

On Wednesday, April 27, 2022, there will be a Traffic Transportation Committee meeting at 6:30pm. DOT is going to present an updated redesign of 34th Avenue.

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On Thursday, April 28, 2022, at 6:30pm there will be an Immigration Committee meeting. They will discuss planning for the Cultural Resource Fair.

Ms. Reid reported that on Friday, April 22, 2022, there will be a car free Earth Day event starting at 6:00pm until the next day at 6:00pm. Ms. Reid said that the No Parking restriction will not be for everybody.

On certain streets there is restricted parking:

- The north side from 69th to 70th Street,
- The south side of 70th to 71st Street
- Both sides of 77th to 78th Street
- The north side of 86th to 87th Street and 93rd Street

Ms. Reid reported that she met with Council Member Francisco Moya, NYPD, 82nd Street BID, Homeless Services, HPD and Board Member Ulrick Gedeon. They looked at the issues of individuals who congregate in front of the Burger King at 82nd Street. They discussed realistic things that can be done to address the issue.

Business Economic Committee Report

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair of the Business Economic Committee, reported that in the Board Members folders is information SLA changes regarding alcohol to go. Anyone with an on-premises liquor license can serve cocktails, beer, wine to go depending on the type of license but it must be served to go with a substantial nutritional value food item. Any closed bottles of wine or alcohol can't be sold. Entire bottles of wine cannot be poured into a container to be sold. Only single cups of alcohol, mixed drinks, wine, and beer can be served depending on the type of on premises license with a substantial food item.

Legislators' Report

Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez

Michelle Luna, representative for Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, reported that the Congresswoman joined constituents in Astoria for Offices second in person Town Hall since February 2020.
