Stephen Kulhanek, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 7:45PM and welcomed all in attendance.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

A representative from Friendly Visitors said that they are volunteers who visit homebound seniors for about an hour each week in their homes. They are sponsored by Sunnyside Community Center and they match homebound seniors with volunteers who share the same interest. To be a volunteer, you have to be 18 years or older and pass a background check. Volunteers help to reduce feelings of isolation, and improve seniors' mental and physical health. The Friendly Visitor Program is funded by grants from City Meals-on-Wheels and serves homebound seniors who receive meal deliveries. Clients receiving services are often unable to go outside on their own and depend on the visitor programs for social interaction. In Community Board 3, there are 14 seniors receiving services from the visitors program; 13 English and one Spanish speaking.

PUBLIC INFORMATION

Council Member Costa Constantinides

Council Member Costa Constantinides thanked everyone on the board for all the great work they are doing. C.M Constantinides stated that he was given a promotion this past summer. He is now the new Chair for Environmental Protection Committee for the New York City Council. He has been involved with this committee for almost 8 years and served as Deputy Chief of Staff. Once he was elected, the committee passed his bill last year in conjunction with the Mayor to reduce City emissions by 80% by the year 2015. In collaboration with the Mayor, a bill was passed that requires all businesses in the City of New York to shut their doors when their air conditioner is running. This bill is a common sense bill. However, there is an exemption to this bill: If you are a business like "The Lemon Ice King" and you serve customers through a window or if you are a side-walk café, and you are serving food, part of the business is going in and out, those businesses are exempt from this law. The Council Member thanked Consumer Affairs for all their help in passing the bill this afternoon. He looks forward to seeing the bill signed.

Council Member Constantinides stated that next week they will be doing a bill on Geo-Thermo measures. This is a bill to pull heat out of the ground to heat your home and cool your home by pushing heat back into the ground. It's cleaner than any air conditioner and any boiler you could possibly think of. They want to set up a regular structure so Geo-Thermo can be done in the homes.

Participatory Budgeting

The Council Member announced that anyone who lives in District Council 22, north of 92nd Street/31st Ave/west of 92nd Street may participate in this budget exercise. This year they will be having the residents of the community decide how \$1.5 million gets spent. There will be an idea assembly on Monday night at the Bulova Center, anyone can come and suggest any idea. Last year over 200 ideas were presented. \$500,000 was added and will only go to the Jackson

Heights and East Elmhurst part of the district. He stated that this is not about him, but it's about what the residents want for their community and how their tax dollars will be spent.

In this year's budget the One Room School house was funded. There will be a new sitting area, trees planted and it will look more beautiful than it currently is. In this year's budget, 1300 new Police Officers were also funded. The C.M is very pleased to work with C.M. Julissa Ferreras, C.M. Daniel Dromm and the people in the City Council on the needs of the community.

Board Member Emma Brandt asked what time on Monday is the Idea Assembly.

Council Member Constantinides said it will be at 7pm at the Bulova Center at 75-20 Astoria Boulevard, and he will be passing around the newsletter.

Board Member David Rosero said that nothing has been done to Astoria Blvd. He requested the C.M. to take a tour of Astoria Blvd. with him.

The Council Member said that he would be happy to come.

Deputy Inspector Brian C. Hennessy – 115th Precinct

The Deputy Inspector introduced the two officers assigned to Diversity Plaza. There is an officer assigned to the 82nd Street commercial district and one to Junction Blvd. He informed the Board that the officers are doing a great job so far.

The Inspector stated that the summer started off very quiet, but as it ended it got very violent. The weekend of August 23rd, there were three separate shootings which started Friday night and ended Sunday night. On Friday night about 9pm on 100th Street between 25th & Astoria Blvd a 24 year old was shot one time in the leg. He was taken to Elmhurst Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Detectives are still working on that case. On Sunday morning at 4am, at 26-49 96th Street, another young male was struck four times with non-life threatening injuries. At 7pm that same night at 90th Street off Roosevelt Ave, an individual was drinking with a few friends, he went to get into his car, an individual approached him with a revolver and shot him 6 times. All three shootings are non-related. One is gang related, one is narcotics related and one is a dispute that went wrong. The cases are currently ongoing and hopefully they will get some positive results shortly. On Saturday, September 4th at 6:50pm, an 80 year old female was walking down 76th Street between 35th and 37th Ave. She was walking with her 91 year old sister-in-law. A 32 year old male approached her, pulled a razor blade, cut her purse from her shoulder, pushed her down to the floor and fled with her purse. Onlookers were able to track him down the street and others called 911. Officers responded and the victim was caught. Two days later the 80 year old lady died in the hospital from the injuries she suffered. That was the first homicide for the year.

Over the last 28 days, crime is down 29.4%. There was 1 murder and 3 rapes. The community is down by 16 robberies, from 39 to 23. Burglaries are down by 17 over the last 28 days and 74 YTD. The DA's office is doing a great job and the 115th precinct follow up with them to make sure that everything is intact. The community is down 28% in grand larceny and up 4% for stolen vehicles. Overall crime is down and the precinct is doing it's very best to make sure that they stay on top of it

Board Member Edwin Westley congratulated Inspector Hennessy for becoming the Deputy Inspector of the 115th Precinct. Mr. Westley stated that with school starting now, they have had at least one abduction of a child. He asked the inspector what is done when crimes like those happen.

The inspector said that they met with the schools in the district before the summer ended and they went over the plans for the school year. The school team consists of one sergeant and four police officers in addition to a youth officer. There are school crossing guards out there and there are school officers assigned to the precinct. Any information or concerns made by the schools are transmitted to one of the officers. The schools have a great relationship with the school sergeant and the information goes back and forth.

Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)

Director of Capital Projects for DEP Shane Ojan stated that on September 30, 2015 there will be a meeting concerning combined sewers at the Al Oerter Recreation Center at Flushing Creek. DEP will discuss the "long term control plans." DEP is trying to find ways to reduce combined sewer overflows into Flushing Bay. The system is not a perfect system; it was built over 30 years ago. DEP would like to separate the sewer but it would cost about \$20 Billion to re-sewer the system. They are trying to do everything they can to reduce the overflows and have come a long way in reducing them. He invited everyone to come to the September 30th meeting at 6pm.

Board Member, Ralph Moreno, asked the representative if it's a possibility to have the same meeting in a more accessible area.

The representative Shane Ojan said that they could set up something, he would look into it with District Manager, Giovanna Reid.

Board Member, Ed Westley said there are many sensing devices in the neighborhood, either monitoring noise or pollution. He would like to know what the readings are on the noise level of LaGuardia within Jackson Heights.

Mr. Ojan said he will find out and get back to us.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters

The Community Outreach Coordinator for Big Brothers/Big Sisters in NYC said that they are the nation's founding and the city's largest mentoring organization. They have served over 100,000 children since 1904 and continue to serve over

4,000 annually. They foster 1-1 mentoring relationships between youth ages 7-17 with a caring adult mentor 21 years or older of the same sex. They meet twice per month and they host recreational activities, such as going to the museums or finding the best hot dog in town. They have every research to prove that these activities over the course of the year make the children more successful. 98% of the children in their program graduate high school and 86% enroll in college. Thanks to the City Council, they are looking to enlarge their footprints in Queens, specifically in Jackson Heights, but they are depending on the Community partners to help them do outreach and to get them on the Community calendars.

Elmcor

Executive Director of Elmcor, Sayeda Dunston, said they are located on 108th & Northern Boulevard. Elmcor developed from a small volunteer organization into a major provider of human services with clients ranging from pre-schoolers to seniors. There are two senior centers, one on 99th & Astoria Blvd and the other located at Lefrak City. They provide services on 108th Street & Northern Blvd for young people. Elmcor has state of the art recreational facilities and would like all the young people in the neighborhood to come and visit. Next week will mark 50 years since Elmcor started providing services in the community.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

CB3 Capital & Expense Budget Priorities FY 2017 – Jimmy Smith, Chair

Jimmy Smith, Chair, invited the public to give new suggestions and comments on the Capital & Expense Priorities for FY2017.

Edwin Westley, Board Member said the Boys & Girls Club are very anxious to come to the community and he would like that to be included in the Capital & Expense Budget Priorities. He is also recommending that it be prioritized in the top five.

Camilo Zamora, Board Member, said that he would like to see more street lights in Jackson Heights and East Elmhurst especially along 90th Street where the trains are. There is absolutely no lighting between 37th Ave & Northern Blvd.

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Phayul Himalayan Rest. Corp.

James Wong, representative said that the owner of Phayul Himalayan Rest. needs the Boards help in getting a wine/beer license. Hours of operation are:

Mon – Wed, 11am to 11pm and weekends 11am to 12am.

Ralph Moreno, Board Member asked how long the restaurant has been in existence.

Mr. Wong said the restaurant has been at the location for more than 4 years, but they changed ownership 2 weeks ago.

Dimensions Latina Tapas Bar, Inc. – 91-13 31 Ave, East Elmhurst, NY (New – Full Liq.)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Dimensions Latina Tapas Bar, Inc.

Patricia Gayle, representative said that this restaurant is new to the community and will be serving Hispanic food. They are applying for a full liquor license.

Shiv Dass, Board Member asked the representative if the owner was present.

Ms. Gayle, representative, said that he is a chef and had a banquet that he was catering for; he was unable to make it.

Ralph Moreno, Board Member asked what the hours of operation were.

Ms. Gayle, representative, said it's from Tuesdays to Sundays 3pm to 2am and closed on Mondays.

Caridad Mak, Board Member said the location is a problematic area. She said there is a school, a church and a daycare nearby.

Ms. Gayle, the representative, said she is not familiar with the area, she is just here representing the owner.

Addictive Wine & Tapas Bar, Inc. – 32-63 87 Street, East Elmhurst, NY (New – Wine/Beer)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Addictive Wine & Tapas Bar, Inc.

The owner said that they will be specializing in authentic tapas from Spain & France with about 100 different wines. There will be no dance floor or loud music.

Emma Brandt, Board Member, asked what tapas means.

The owner said that tapas is a very small bite like an appetizer.

Edwin Westley, Board Member, said that if this is going to be a community tapas bar, why is that that they will be opening weekdays until 2am and on weekends until 4am.

The owner said that they want to do something different to the neighborhood. A lot of people in the neighborhood want to go out at nights and sit down to enjoy a glass of wine without going too far.

JIR Restaurant Corp. – 83-12A/83-14 37 Ave, Jackson Heights, NY (New – Full Liq.)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of JIR Restaurant Corp.

Sandra Olaya, representative said that this location is owned by three partners. They will be serving a combination of food from Pollos Marios and Las Magaritas. There will be no dancing on the premise and a stipulation was submitted to that effect.

Cherry Blossom Buffet Inc. – 86-12^a 37th Ave, Jackson Heights, NY (New – Wine/Beer)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Cherry Blossom Buffet Inc.

James Wong, representative said that this restaurant has been in existence for about five years. The original name was Tomo Komo. The hours of operation will be from 11am – 12am. It's a Japanese restaurant and sushi bar.

Tradiciones Mexicans Corp. – 96-07 37th Ave, Corona, NY (New – Wine/Beer)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Tradiciones Mexicans Corp.

The owner said it will be a family restaurant and the hours of operation will be 12noon to 2am.

Lima Restaurant Corp. – 85-07 Northern Blvd. Jackson Heights, NY (New – Full Liq.)

Edmund Rosenbaum, Co-Chair, called upon the owner of Lima Restaurant Corp.

Carlos Mejia, president of Lima Restaurant said they will be serving traditional Peruvian dishes and it's a family owned restaurant. They will be open for breakfast and will serve no later than 2am on weekdays. There will be no dancing in the restaurant.

Edwin Westley, Board Member said he is a bit concerned; If this is a family restaurant, why is it that they are opening until 4am.

The president said that regarding their operating hours, he is in line with what the other businesses on Northern Blvd. are doing. They close at 4am, so he didn't think it would be a problem.

Legislators Report

Deanna Foote, Representative, Senator Jose Peralta read the Senators statement from his message of the week regarding the Department of Homeless Services turning hotels into emergency homeless shelters.

Senator Joes Peralta states “We are not opposing the shelter outright because, as everyone knows, anyone is a paycheck away from being homeless. My pressing concern is that the City brought another homeless facility into the neighborhood without any community input and after earlier stating that the site was not being considered as a location to house homeless families. The

administration cannot bring another shelter into the community without increasing services and resources available to residents.

As an elected official, I represent the interests of my constituents and worry about their quality of life. If a homeless shelter, or any other facility, has a negative impact on resources such as sanitation, health, education and public safety, it is my responsibility to air these concerns.

This is why I would encourage my colleagues in the Assembly to pass a bill that would require the City to provide communities with the chance to provide their comments and input on any plans to open or expand these social services centers. I am a co-sponsor of this legislation that passed the Senate earlier this year.”

Bill Meehan, Board Member, stated that “Queens has half the amount of shelters as Bronx, Brooklyn and Manhattan and that the city has an obligation to remedy the problem (of homelessness). He said, “Shelters are not the answer and are a temporary Band-Aid.” Mr. Meehan added that affordable housing and jobs are answers to the homelessness problem.

Deanna Foote acknowledged Mr. Meehan’s comments but added that the issue wasn’t about what the DHS is doing but how they went about letting the elected officials know about sites such as The Landing. They notified the community and elected officials only a day before it opened, even after the DHS said that it would not be utilized as such.

Elise Miguel, Representative, Assemblyman Francisco Moya, said that the Assemblyman was named Chair of the Legislative Commission of Science & Technology this year. His main priority is to incorporate more tech into the school system to help children get jobs in the future. He has been meeting with many principals & working with different tech companies in the area. He is also working on the curbstoning Bill, which targets private owners and car dealerships are utilizing city streets to store and sell cars. The Assemblyman is cracking down on this practice.

The Assemblyman is also working on the Job Seekers Bill. Employment agencies prey on new immigrants and low wage earners. They charge fees for services and promise jobs that never materialize. Assemblyman Moya has proposed legislation to put a halt to these operations from clogging up on streets and taking away precious parking spaces.

Gary Gilbert, representative from Assemblyman Michael DenDekker’s office, said that he’s inviting everyone to a free community event. It’s a paper shredding, on Sunday, September 20th from 10am - 4pm. An electronic recycling event will be held at the Waldbaums shopping center - 77th Street between 30th & 31st Ave.
